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South Dakota FFA Foundation Awards \$2,000 in Grants for Local FFA Chapter Service Learning Projects

"Success in Sight"

At the upcoming national FFA convention, South Dakota has three finalists in proficiency awards and two finalists in Star awards. To get to the national level, each member developed an SAE and worked very hard to expand and improve it over the course of many years.



Adam Eichacker from the McCook Central FFA Chapter is our first National Proficiency Finalist in Diversified Crop Production-Entrepreneurship. His SAE consists of renting two fields from a neighbor totaling up to eighty-two acres. On this land, he has been raising corn and soybeans for the past six years. With his income from his SAE, he continues

to fund the SAE as well as paying for his education at SDSU where he is majoring in Agriculture Science. When asked what his favorite part of his SAE is, Adam replied that he loves running the combine at harvest time and that "there is nothing more rewarding than seeing the yields that have come from years of decisions." On the flip side of things, one of his greatest challenges lately has been low grain prices. Because he pays many expenses such as seed, chemicals, and land rent, it can be difficult to make a profit. When asked what other comments he had to add, Adam replied that he would like to extend a thank you to his local FFA chapter and family for their support and assistance



Mark Streff from McCook Central is our next finalist in the Fiber and/ or Oil Crop Production Proficiency. His SAE consists of both working for his parents on their farm in soybean production as well as renting some of his own land and putting it into his own production for the past two years. With the profits Mark generates from his SAE, he continues to re-invest them

to continue expanding his experience. When I asked Mark what is favorite part of his SAE was, he says that "harvest is my favorite; I get to see everything I've done throughout the year come together." Some challenges that he faced was weed resistance to certain herbicides. To counter the negative effects of this, Mark made sure he used an aggressive herbicide program and also spent many hours pulling weeds in especially problematic areas.



Our final National Proficiency Finalist is Andrew Streff from McCook Central. He is a finalist in Grain Production Entrepreneurship where he rents land to put into corn production. Andrew runs every aspect of his SAE from applying fertilizer in the spring all the way to marketing the crop when he feels the price is best. Andrew's favorite part of his SAE is seeing the

improvement he has made over the past few years in his management decisions. "I like how in production agriculture, no matter how good I do, I can always improve myself which is a great motivator for me to keep working," said Andrew. A challenge he faced while working on his SAE was trying to market his corn for the highest price possible while not knowing what the market would do. To overcome this challenge, Andrew attended various marketing meetings and spoke to those superior to him to help educate himself. The only final comment Andrew has is thanking his FFA chapter and family for the constant encouragement and support they have given him.

Our two Star finalists are Shane Mueller of the Garretson FFA Chapter and Liz Renner of the West Central FFA. The Star awards are the most prestigious award given in the National FFA organization for a member's SAE.

Shane is qualified as a Star in Agribusiness finalist. This award is for a member whose SAE was starting and running their own agriculturally related business. The purpose of this award is to encourage students to explore what it is like starting and running their own business. Shane's SAE consists of two parts; the first one in custom hay baling where he has grown the business to approximately 4,000 bales a summer and a full line of haying equipment and the second part of his SAE is restoring farm equipment for resale. Shane's favorite part of this SAE is getting to do something that he likes doing. A challenge Shane has faced is financing his businesses. He had to start very small with old equipment and work his way up slowly.





Liz's Star award in Agriscience is for a member who creates their own agriscience experiment or partakes in one. The purpose of agriscience is to help a member get started in researching agriculturally related topics so that new improvements can continue to be made in agriculture. Liz's SAE consists of multiple research projects, with different projects

studying the effects of common herbicides on the mortality rates of the common water flea Daphnia magna, the effects of herbicides on the reproductive success of the endangered American Burying Beetle, burying beetles using activity monitors to determine their temporal activity patterns (which will help the USFWS better manage them so they don't disturb the beetles by doing monitoring when they're most active) and a project where she focused on using stable isotope analysis on soil samples to analyze changes in carbon isotope signatures. Her work in research has led her to being published in a scientific journal.

She has interned with the Natural Resources Conservation Service, worked for the Minnehaha Conservation District, and most recently interned this past summer as a biological technician for the South Dakota Department of Transportation. Liz's favorite part of her SAE is getting to be outside every day and encountering some amazing fish species in her latest internship. She credits her SAE for her increased ability to problem solve – she states "I've become a bit of a MacGyver when it comes to fixing things".
