National FFA Names South Dakota Member Star in Agricultural Placement



For **Andrew Streff**, an interest in agriculture is all in the family. "Growing up, my brothers and I had this sandbox out back of our house. We'd go outside supposed to be playing in the sandbox—and then go

running off to the shed to hang out with Dad to work on equipment," Streff said. "So, the passion has been there, right from the beginning."

Streff, from the McCook Central FFA Chapter, started his supervised agricultural experience (SAE) on the family farm, tending to 1,500 acres of corn and soybeans with his father. "I was driving a tractor on my own since I was 10 years old, and that really transitioned well into my FFA career once I got into that during high school," he said.

He added on to his SAE by completing two internships. His first internship was in 2017 with the Central Farmers Cooperative as a crop scout intern. In that role, Streff surveyed thousands of acres of crops and reported their status to local farmers. Then, he crossed state lines to work as an agriculture technology specialist intern at Winfield United in Ohio, running test plot trials and helping crop producers troubleshoot issues.

Streff said a person can never know too much about agriculture, and continuing to get an education is key. "Every day is a learning experience, and FFA really emphasized that you can take advantage of a learning experience in a work environment," he said. "You don't have to sit in a classroom to learn."

Each year at the National FFA Convention, four FFA members are honored with American Star Awards (Star Farmer, Star in Agribusiness, Star in Agricultural Placement and Star in Agriscience) for outstanding accomplishments in FFA and agricultural education. Stars demonstrate outstanding agricultural skills and competencies through completion of an SAE. Other requirements to achieve the award include demonstrating top management skills; completing key agricultural education, scholastic and leadership requirements; and earning an American FFA Degree, the organization's highest level of student accomplishment. Stars received cash awards totaling \$4,000.

McCook Central FFA is partnering with one of its members to create an event entitled "Let's Talk: Learn How to Identify Stress & Support Our Producers," which was held February 3rd. The night included booths from places such as Avera or Southeastern Behavioral Health with free resources for attendees, a meal, and an address given by Karl Oehlke from the Avera Rural Mental Health Hotline. The chapter is also working hard to prepare for another successful FFA week including our annual FFA Pancake Feed.

Parker had a rewarding time working with the local bread giveaway to unload all the food that was given away during the holiday season. This was a great experience for many of our members and we have started a partnership with this program to help unload this every month.

Viborg-Hurley is planning a partnership with NuGen to farm 135 acres as a chapter. Members will be responsible for everything from buying the seed through harvesting the crops.

Wall FFA is currently working to create state-wide Beef to School curriculum for schools to use in South Dakota. Wall was the first school in SD to serve local beef as a part of their school lunches, and the FFA was instrumental in implementing that program.

Webster FFA had 29 agricultural education students from the Webster Area school toured the Watertown ethonal bio refinery. Students learned about water quality, corn moisture content, enzymes, emulsifiers, pH controls and that each plant has its own recipe to make the alcohol. The plant is getting about 2.95 gallons of alcohol per bushel of corn. The plant takes in nearly 200,000 bushels/day. The plant then markets its alcohol, dried distillers grain, corn syrup and corn oil.

Winner FFA parliamentary procedure team got to showcase their skills and do a demonstration for 4-H Leaders in their county in early January. They got to use their contest skills in a very real way.

AFNR Teacher Winter Professional Development



Current and future agriculture educators from across the state came together in Brookings, South Dakota to improve their skills, share their knowledge, network with other teachers and bring something new back to their home chapter. This was the fifth year for the Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources (AFNR) Winter Professional Development Conference. Attendees had the opportunity to choose from 20 different sessions and 10 different lab stations to fill their specific needs, covering a variety of topics relating to each of the three components of the three-circle model of agricultural education - classroom/laboratory, Supervised Agricultural Experience (work-based learning) and FFA (career and technical student organization). Michelle Nelson brought post-secondary instructors from SDSU and industry professionals to facilitate current and relevant professional development, as well as current secondary agriculture instructors to present their specialties and share their knowledge. As Brianna Larson, advisor for the Sturgis FFA Chapter, shared, "The teacher-led workshops were very insightful and helpful in spicing up our programs and an invaluable opportunity to find engaging content for our students."

Participants gained a wide variety of knowledge to utilize in their local programs including new skills, curriculum resources and hands-on activities to enhance each of the three components of the three-circle model of agricultural education. As Ms. Larson also mentioned, "It was a great opportunity to network with advisors from across the state," which will definitely serve as an indispensable resource for the future.

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Past State Officers Gain Insight into Ag Practices Abroad



Culture erupted as Marie Robbins and Sarah Kroeger attended the International Leadership Seminar for State Officers (ILSSO) in Spain and Portugal this past January. Robbins and Kroeger, along with 73 other past and present state FFA officers from around the country, learned about agriculture practices used in Spain and Portugal. ILSSO is a program organized by the National FFA Organization that gives state officers the opportunity to gain knowledge about agriculture on an international scale.

"ILSSO was one of the most memorable

experiences I've had as an FFA member. Traveling internationally really opens your eyes to a whole new world of customs and traditions," said Kroeger.

During the 10-day trip, they had the opportunity to visit a cattle feedlot, greenhouses, olive, citrus and cork farms, meet with young agriculturists in Spain, the U.S. Ambassador to Portugal, George Glass and the USDA Agricultural Attaché, Jennifer Clever.

Robbins and Kroeger had the chance to visit a 5,000 head Rugian Feedlot that raises Limousine and Charolais bulls for consumption. Cattle are left intact so the animal experiences the most stress-free life possible.

"To see that although they do things differently, it all still works the same and makes them a profit, was incredible," said Kroeger.

Robbins and Kroeger also learned of some of the challenges that Spanish producers face. European Union regulations are stricter than the regulations of the U.S. and other countries. For example, in Spain they can't use pesticides on crops, or hormones and feed additives in cattle and gene editing. At a meeting with young agriculturalists, producers highlighted that access to technology is one of the challenges of farming in their country. Many producers feel that with access to gene editing they would be more competitive on a global scale, which would also help boost the economy.

The current inconsistency in Spain's government is also creating challenges for farmers. When talking with the young agriculturalists, Robbins learned that there is no one for them to go to with issues because the system has been changing so frequently in the last few years.

In the southern part of Spain known as Costa del Sol or the Coast of the Sun, over 30,000 hectares of greenhouses are located. Each greenhouse lies right next to one another, creating what looks like a sea of recycled plastic. Most greenhouses are owned by first- or second-generation farmers who operate 5-7 hectares. The greenhouses were first used here almost 60 years ago to protect the plants from the winds coming off the ocean. Peppers, melons, tomatoes, cucumbers, green beans and watermelons are just a few of the plants grown in these greenhouses. Instead of using herbicides and pesticides, the enclosed greenhouse has allowed for effective use of sticky traps and pheromone emitting traps to get rid of harmful pests. Introducing friendly pests like ladybugs and spider mites has also helped to protect the plants.

"In the greenhouse where tomatoes were growing, they used cocoa nut husks as soil. Instead of growing out of the ground, each plant was in $12 \times 24 \times 6$ -inch box raised about four inches off the ground and filled with cocoa nut husks," said Kroeger.

The experience was life changing for both Robbins and Kroeger.

"I would travel abroad again in a heartbeat. I always thought I had an understanding of other cultures but until you actually have firsthand experience in a different culture, you can't fully appreciate its customs and traditions," said Robbins.

Nearly 500 FFA members from across South Dakota met in Pierre December 8th for the State FFA Leadership Development Events (LDEs). Students qualified through district competitions, advancing the top two teams and top three individuals from each of the seven FFA districts in South Dakota. While waiting for competitive events, students had the opportunity to interact with agriculture industry leaders, who are SD FFA Star Partners, at the Career Carnival. Additionally, Pioneer representatives presented two workshops titled "Uncovering Value," which engaged members in stretching their leadership skills. FFA members and chapters were recognized for their success in 11 leadership areas at the awards banquet. 1. Teacher Appreciation Breakfast - Members get to school early to fix a buffet style breakfast to thank their teachers - or deliver them a cupcake and a coke at the end of the school day, with a thank you note for everything they do for students.

2. Greenhand Night - 1st year FFA members are invited to a night filled with games, leadership activities and helpful FFA hints to make the most out of their years ahead in the blue jacket.

3. Sponsor recognition - In official dress, members deliver baked goods and thank you letters to chapter sponsors and supporters in their community.

4. FFA Emblem Scavenger Hunt - What better way to celebrate FFA week, than to get the whole school involved? At the beginning of the week, chapter officers hide FFA emblems around the school. Anyone who finds an emblem can bring it to the ag classroom and be entered to win a prize.

5. Speak Loud and Proud - Schedule newspaper, radio or T.V. interviews to share our FFA values and mission. Also, share ag education facts on social

media to spread the word about FFA and ag education to others. Members talk on why they started and stayed in FFA, and the opportunities they have had as members.
